

No homo? – Yes homo?

Is it because in modern society it is being seen gay if men show their feelings and emotions to other men? And why do women don't say that have they accepted different sexual orientations?

One should think that in this modern society were living in freedom and equality are widely accepted as well as different sexual orientations.

But this doesn't mean that it's universally accepted.

According to a 2013 report by the Pew Research Center (Washington, USA), 65% of women believe homosexuality should be accepted, while only 55% of men believe the same.
